#### 4. MONTEREY-SALINAS TRANSIT ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT PLANNING STUDY

The Committee received a presentation from the Monterey-Salinas Transit District regarding the Transit Oriented Development Planning Study.

Michelle Overmeyer, Monterey-Salinas Transit (MST), reported that MST is leading a planning study to identify opportunities to increase transit-oriented development (TOD) viability by enhancing multimodal connections within the SURF! Busway and Bus Rapid Transit project corridor through the implementation of enhanced bicycle, transit, and pedestrian facilities; and Transportation Demand Management (TDM) strategies.

Mike Iswalt, Kimley-Horn, reported that they have completed a comprehensive Background Conditions report, which reviewed land use policies and transportation plans within the study area and identified opportunity areas and constraints for TOD and transit-supportive projects.

Mr. Iswalt announced the Transit Fair and Family Fun Day Event would be held on June 10 at the Marina Transit Exchange.

The Committee had the following comments and input on the Monterey-Salinas Transit District Transit Oriented Development Planning Study:

- Consider future connections between Monterey-Salinas Transit and the nearby cities.
- Consider advertising the Monterey-Salinas Transit bus routes to the community as a different way to travel and not worry about parking.
- Consider "Friday night special bus" to different cities each week.
- Consider looking into expanding the bus schedule times to get more users that work late and unusual times.
- Consider community engagement at in-person pop-ups, farmers markets, and the First Friday art events.
- Consider "social housing" instead of "affordable housing" (the Netherlands have a successful strategy of mixing different incomes in housing developments).
- Consider service improvements on Alisal Street in Salinas; they have the highest ridership and getting through the industrial area is challenging.

#### 5. SALINAS VISION ZERO UPDATE

The Committee received a presentation on the Salinas Vision Zero program.

Andrew Easterling, Salinas City Traffic Engineer, reported that the Salinas City Council passed a Resolution adopting a Vision Zero Policy, and directing city staff to develop a Vision Zero Action Plan. "Vision Zero" is a strategy to eliminate all traffic fatalities and severe injuries, while increasing safe, healthy, and equitable mobility for all. Mr. Easterling noted that to develop the Vision Zero Action Plan, City staff compiled 10 years of collision data, and created maps to help illustrate spatial patterns and trends and identify a High Injury Network (HIN) that identified roadway segments where high frequencies of fatal or severe injury collisions occur. Following the adoption of the Action Plan in August 2021, the city began working to implement safety improvement projects. In conclusion, Mr. Easterling noted that the Vision Zero Action Plan is intended to be a living document which will be updated every 4 to 5 years.

The Committee had the following comments and input on the Salinas Vision Zero program:

- Consider purchasing a small sweeper to clean the narrow bike lanes with delineators.
- Due to damaged sidewalks, pedestrians sometimes walk in the bike lanes.
- Consider educating pedestrians and bicyclists on safety issues.
- Consider creating barriers to get vehicles to stop driving through the bike lane.
- Consider looking at the Caltrans Highway Design Manual on the chip seal due to the dangerous rough surface that has caused bike accidents.
- Consider getting the cities to clean-up the gravel after a chip seal on the bike lanes and gutters for safety.

#### 6. COMPETITIVE GRANTS REVIEW COMMITTEE

The Committee nominated up to three members of the Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee to serve on the TAMC Competitive Grant Application Review Committee.

Janneke Strause, Transportation Planner, reported that the Transportation Agency Board approved a new cycle of competitive grants at its March 2023 meeting. She noted that the grant applications for projects proposed for funding are due June 1, 2023. In conclusion, Ms. Strause noted that Agency staff are seeking to establish an ad hoc committee to review and rank the applications and provide funding recommendations.

Andrew Easterling suggested that TAMC staff pair up a Technical Advisory Committee member and a Bicycle and Pedestrian Advisory Committee member to come up with a grant application score together.

#### 7. ASSEMBLY BILL 825 BRYAN – BICYCLES ON SIDEWALKS

Committee Member Wegestein moved, and Committee Member Johnson seconded to recommend the TAMC Board take an "oppose" position on Assembly Bill 825: Bicycle on sidewalks.

The committee received information and provided feedback to staff on a proposed state bill related to bicycles on sidewalks.

Christina Watson, Director of Planning, reported that Assembly Bill 825 (Bryan): "Bicycles on Sidewalks" would prohibit local authorities from prohibiting bicycles on sidewalks adjacent to highway or corridor that does not include a bikeway. She noted that TAMC currently has a "watch" position on this bill.

The Committee had the following comments and input on AB 825:

 Allowing bicyclists to use the sidewalks would be dangerous to pedestrians, especially those with disabilities.

- It is important to educate the community that the bicycle has the same rights to a road as any other vehicle.
- The key issue is local governmental control; this bill presents a one-size-fits-all solution to a problem that is not consistent across the state.
- The author's reasons for this bill, questionable law enforcement tactics, is not solved by
  this bill, which introduces two new rules for bicyclists using sidewalks, so the police could
  still use these new infractions in the same way they currently use local prohibitions of
  biking on sidewalks, to target minorities.

## 8. ANNOUNCEMENTS AND/OR COMMENTS

Committee Member Johnson announced that the City of Carmel-By-the-Sea has been having highway issues and has been in contact with Transportation Agency staff and Caltrans.

Committee Member Petersen commented that the City of Carmel should consider looking into installing bicycle boulevards such as those found in Palo Alto.

Chair Novo announced that the road to the Pinnacles has been chip sealed and has some serious loose gravel that can be a bicyclist's nightmare when riding downhill.

#### **SUMMARY:**

Approval by the Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities Advisory Committee is required for applicants to the Active Transportation Support Program to be awarded. TAMC has received an application from the Salinas Community Science Workshop for bicycle repair and maintenance tools.

### **FINANCIAL IMPACT:**

The Salinas Community Science Workshop has requested \$3,800 for bicycle repair tools for use by the public and use by the Salinas Community Science Workshop bicycle mechanics. The funding source for the public tools at a cost of \$2,800 is Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) funds. The remaining cost of the tools, at \$1,000, will be covered by funding from the Bike SAFE program, which has a budget of \$27,500 for materials to promote bicycling.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

TAMC has not received any previous applications for the Active Transportation Support Program this fiscal year, and staff recommends accepting these grant requests.

#### **RECOMMENDED ACTION:**

**RECOMMEND** the Transportation Agency Board of Directors program \$10.4 million of Regional Surface Transportation Program funds to the 2023 Competitive Grants Program of Projects.

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Transportation Agency Board approved releasing a call for projects for a new cycle of competitive grants at its March 2023 meeting. The grant applications were due June 1, 2023. Agency staff established an ad hoc committee of Bicycle & Pedestrian Facilities Advisory and Technical Advisory Committee members to review and rank the applications and provide funding recommendations. The resulting list of recommended projects is provided in this staff report.

#### FINANCIAL IMPACT:

At their March 25, 2023 meeting, the Transportation Agency Board voted to use \$10.75 million of Regional Surface Transportation Program and Transportation Development Act 2% funds from the Transportation Agency's FY 2023/24, 2024/25 and 2025/26 allocation for a new round of competitive grants, with \$1 million dedicated to Quick-Build Projects and the remaining \$9.75 million for Competitive Program Projects.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

In establishing the Regional Surface Transportation Program Competitive Grants program, the Transportation Agency is seeking to fund projects that advance the goals of the Transportation Agency Board. These include delivering projects of regional significance that improve safety, provide maintenance for existing facilities, or support the development of a multimodal transportation network utilizing the principles of Complete Streets. Fair geographic balance in distributing the funds and the cost effectiveness of the proposed projects are also taken into consideration when awarding grant funds.

The competitive grant application is composed of four sections, each with 25 available points, for a total possible application score of 100 points. The four categories are Project Information & Regional Significance, Complete Streets, Project Readiness & Cost Effectiveness, and Prior Project Delivery Performance. The scoring for the application was approved by the Transportation Agency Board to favor projects that improve regional routes with high traffic volumes, include bicycle and pedestrian facilities and safety enhancements, can be completed within the three-year funding window, and support sponsors that are utilizing their Regional Surface Transportation Program fair share allocations and have a history of delivering projects within the three-year funding cycle.

The quick-build grant application is composed of one section for a total possible application score of 100 points. The scoring for the application was approved by the Transportation Agency Board to favor projects that uses semi-permanent materials to test a concept that quickly addresses a safety need, continuously engages the community throughout the duration of the project, measures progress and performance, and provides a foundation for potential permanent infrastructure.

#### **Competitive Grant Program**

The Transportation Agency received twelve completed competitive grant applications, totaling \$22,744,500 in requested Regional Surface Transportation Program grant funding. Each application was reviewed and scored by five committee members. The attached summary sheet provides an overview of the projects submitted for consideration, and how the applications were scored by the review committee. After considering the scores and factoring in geographic equity and cost effectiveness, the following projects are recommended by Agency staff for grant funding in ranked order:

- King City U.S. Highway 101/Broadway Street at San Antonio Drive Roundabout Improvement Project \$3,519,000
- Marina Del Monte Boulevard and Reservation Road Intersection Improvements \$1,717,500
- Monterey-Salinas Transit MST Countywide Bus Stop Project \$425,000
- City of Soledad West Street Road Diet and Complete Street Project \$2,758,000
- City of Salinas Harden Parkway Path and Safe Routes to School Project \$1,556,000

The total amount of projects recommended for funding is \$9.975 million, which is in excess of the fund estimate approved by the Transportation Agency Board of \$9.75 million. Staff proposes to utilize the balance of funds allocated to the Quick-Build Projects, see proposed program of projects below.

#### **Quick-Build Grant Program**

The Transportation Agency received four complete quick-build grant applications, totaling \$732,500 in requested Regional Surface Transportation Program grant funding. Each application was reviewed and scored by five committee members. The attached summary sheet provides an overview of the projects submitted for consideration, and how the applications were scored by the review committee. After considering the scores and factoring in whether the project satisfied the program's intention, the following projects are recommended by Agency staff for grant funding in ranked order:

- City of Salinas East Market Street Cycle Track Quick Build \$326,000
- City of Monterey Madison/Hermann/Larkin Traffic Circle \$119,120

• King City - Division Street Bike Lanes & SRTS Crosswalk Upgrades - \$117,380

The total amount of projects recommended for funding is \$562,500, which is less than the fund estimate approved by the Transportation Agency Board of \$1 million. Staff proposes to transfer \$225,500 of approved Quick-Build Project funding to cover the balance of funds for the proposed program of projects in the Competitive Grant Program.
